With the help of technological advances, researchers are increasingly able to process immense amounts of data ("big data") and to come up with results confirming or refuting observations from text-based close-reading processes. But which conditions must be met to conduct research of this kind? In which ways are methods of analyzing texts digitally (Distant Reading – Macroanalysis – Stylometrics)? In which areas are we able to apply Distant Reading textual sciences (intertextuality, network analysis, sentiment analysis, authorship attribution, topic modelling...)? In which ways are Distant and Close Reading connected?


